Addendum 1: Alternate Age Sub-Sampling Plan

An alternate age sub-sampling plan was developed in order to improve efficiencies in household recruitment while maintaining the target age distribution for the study, namely 62.5% (10,000 out of 16,000 subjects) aged 45-74 years and 38.5% (6,000 out of 16,000 subjects) aged 18-44 years. The plan is as follows:

- 1. Households are first screened for eligibility (at least one Hispanic/Latino person aged 18-74 years at the sampled address).
- 2. All persons aged 45-74 years are invited to participate.
- 3. A random subsample of households is selected in which all other persons (18-44 years) are also invited to participate.

The original 'Take All Persons' sub-sampling plan initially implemented for HCHS/SOL keeps the household intact, so that either everyone in the household is in the study, or no one is. This alternate plan treats households as consisting of two clusters, those aged 45-74 yrs and those aged 18-44 yrs. The older adult cluster is always selected, thus always invited to participate, and the younger adult cluster is only selected a fraction of the time. The age distribution of the population at each location drives the sampling fraction applied to the younger adult cluster.

A selection probability is generated during the screening interview to determine whether the younger cluster (ages 18-44 years) from the sampled household is in the sample or not. Once selection is determined based on the probability, either all persons 18-74 years are invited to participate in the study OR only those household members age 45-74 are invited to participate in the study, and the scheduling of clinic exams begins (Addendum Appendix I and II).

The number of households needed to participate at each field center (FC) in order to achieve the study sample size of 4,000 individuals per FC with the required age distribution (2,500 aged 45-74 years and 1,500 aged 18-44 years) depends on the average number of 45 – 74 year-old persons per household in the FC's target geographic region. The rate at which remaining household members are selected depends on the average number of 18 – 44 year old persons per household in the region. Both of these averages are estimated from the household composition data collected during recruitment and recorded as household rosters on the ELE form. It is important that each recruiter completes the household rosters and enters the data into the study wide data management system (DMS) as soon after screening as possible. The coordinating center monitors the roster data regularly to inform and adjust the sampling process.

The alternate sub-sampling plan enables FCs with younger age distributions in their target geographic areas to screen substantially fewer households in order to meet the 62.5% target for older adults. In addition, as with the original plan, the sub-sampling at the household level is preserved; there is no need to apply probabilities of selection at the individual level within a household.

With this plan there is a fundamental shift in the recruitment message that is used when the entire household is not selected. Rather than delivering the message that a household is not selected for the study during the screening visit, field staff focus on the fact that ALL persons aged 45-74 yrs are being recruited. This plan may simplify the messages sent through community relations efforts about the study design.

As with the original plan, the alternate age sub-sampling design is used to provide a representative sample of Hispanics/Latinos living in the four FC communities. However, the representative nature of the sample is only maintained through recruitment efforts that will ensure high participation rates among household members, once they are selected and identified as eligible.

With the alternate age sub-sampling plan remember...

The older cluster (persons aged 45 – 74 years old) is ALWAYS selected.

The younger cluster (persons aged 18 – 74 years old) is SOMETIMES selected.

Screening Interview Process

As with the original sampling plan, recruitment steps include the mailing of an introduction letter, telephone contact (optional), and in-person contact. For details on each step of the recruitment process see the Recruiter's Manual, Section 3.2.

As in the original sampling plan, each household contacted in the sample must be screened to determine eligibility. Eligibility at the household level is defined as:

- The household contains at least one member who is Hispanic/Latino aged 18-74 years
- The household does not have definite plans to move out of the area (at least 250 miles away for the Bronx FC; at least 100 miles away for the Chicago and San Diego FCs, and out of Miami-Dade county for the Miami FC) in the next six months

Once eligibility is determined, the information on the household is recorded on the alternate age sub-sampling screening form (Addendum Appendix I and II). If the household is eligible to participate the interviewer proceeds to determine if only the older cluster is invited to participate or if both the older and younger cluster (18- 44 years of age) are invited to participate. Since the older cluster is always invited to participate under the alternate age sub-sampling plan, the interviewer must first determine if the younger cluster is selected to participate.

To determine selection for the younger cluster, the selection probability (p) generated for the household is compared to the cut-point (c) for the FC. The numbers p and c are provided by the Coordinating Center on pre-printed HSRB forms.

• Scenario A: If the selection probability is greater than or equal to the cut-point ($p \ge c$), the younger cluster is NOT selected for participation. Only the older cluster is invited to participate, i.e. all Hispanic/Latino persons 45 - 74 years of age.

• Scenario B: If the selection probability is less than or equal to the cut-point (p<c), the younger cluster is selected for participation. Both the younger and older clusters are invited to participate, i.e. all Hispanic/Latino persons 18 – 74 years of age.

Once it is determined if the younger cluster is selected to be invited for participation in the study, continue with the original study protocol, read the appropriate scripts (Addendum Appendix III), roster all appropriate persons in the household, and determine individual eligibility. In addition to script in both English and Spanish, frequently asked questions (Addendum Appendix IV) are available to assist recruiters in their efforts.

- The household roster is completed, with the name, age, gender, and relationship to the respondent (person with whom you are speaking) included on the roster
- Screen individual household members for eligibility criteria established by the Steering Committee. Any household member that fits into the following situations is deemed ineligible to participate and should <u>not</u> be recruited:
 - 1. Household member is in active military duty
 - 2. Household member plans to relocate the following distances with in the next 6 months Bronx, New York more than 250 miles away Chicago, Illinois and San Diego, California more than 100 miles away Miami, Florida out of Miami-Dade County
 - 3. Household member does not speak English or Spanish. (Please note: this does NOT include hearing impaired. For more information on hearing impaired participants, see Section 6.2.1).

Note: A household member who is a college student that is absent for part of the year, but can complete the clinic visit next year or before the end of the baseline examination period is deemed to be eligible.

As with the original plan, adherence to the alternate age sub-sampling plan is critical to the success of the study. Recall from Section 2.2.4 of the Recruiter's Manual that Hispanics/Latinos living in the US tend to be a young population, while the HCHS/SOL sample requirements are for 62.5% of the sample to be 45-74 years of age. To accomplish this goal under the alternate age sub-sampling plan, all Hispanic/Latino adult aged 45 – 74 years of age are invited to participate in the study (older cluster), while only a subset of the younger clusters (18-44 years of age) is selected for the study.

Training

Training on the alternate age sub-sampling plan was conducted in August of 2008 in North Carolina by the CC. The goal of the training was to prepare FC supervisors to return to their sites and train their field staff, a train the trainers approach. The objectives of the training were to:

- Re-train on the study recruitment protocol
- Explain the alternate age sub-sample design
- Develop training modules and materials to use in training FC recruitment staff at each site
- Prepare for certification of recruitment staff

Powerpoint presentations used for the August training session are available on the study website (www.cscc.unc.edu/hchs/) under study members area/training materials/sampling & recruitment (password protected). FC trainers should use these presentations for recruitment staff training.

Certification

Attendees of the August 2008 training were certified in the alternate age sub-sampling plan for HCHS/SOL. Through the use of the Recruiter's Manual and addendums and training sessions at each field center, recruitment staff who did not attend the training can be certified.

For certification, previously certified HCHS/SOL recruitment staff are required to attend a training session on the alternate age sub-sampling plan at their site that is conducted by the certified recruitment trainer. Staff are expected to be familiar with the alternate age sub-sampling plan and materials pertaining to the alternate plan. The certification checklist and quiz should be completed by each staff and submitted to the CC for final approval (Addendum Appendix V).

New staff that have not been previously certified in HCHS/SOL recruitment must be trained and certified as outlined in Section 4 of the Recruiter's Manual in addition to receiving training and becoming certified on the alternate age sub-sampling plan.

Remember, all new staff need training and certification prior to field work. In addition, refresher training may be needed at regular intervals for continuing staff.

Retraining

Retraining can be a good opportunity to share what is working and what is not in the field. The need for retraining of recruitment staff is assessed throughout the project. This assessment is based on CC's monitoring of recruitment efforts, mid-course changes in recruitment protocol, or when conversion from paper forms to hand-held devices occurs. If it is deemed necessary to have a refresher training, recruitment staff are expected to attend with the goal of re-certification

In addition, weekly recruitment calls for addressing questions and issues and sharing success stories are scheduled by the CC. All recruitment staff are encouraged to attend these calls.

HCHS/SOL Question by Question Instructions, Household Screening Form (HSR), Version B

General Instructions

This form is to be used during recruitment of households. Copies of forms with pre-printed addresses, Household ID Numbers, and numbers for *selection p* and *cut-point c* will be provided by the Coordinating Center to each Field Center. Both English and Spanish language scripts that are to be used when completing this form can be found in the Recruiter's Manual.

The questions refer to individuals who are living in the household at the time and date of the recruitment visit or call. Please record all responses by respondent on the paper form. Each form should then be entered into the HCHS/SOL study data management system within 48-72 hours after collection. It is important to note that in the DMS you will have to select 'HSR Household Screening RosterPIL' in the drop down menu to enter the HSRB.

Note that weekly screening and recruitment reports that are being shared with the Steering Committee are generated every Monday based on data entered into the DMS by 9:00 a.m. PST.

Question by Question Instructions

This question asks if anyone lives in the household who is Hispanic or Latino. The populations of interest for HCHS/SOL are persons or descendants of persons from Cuba, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Spanish speaking countries in the Caribbean and Central and South America. A complete list of countries of interest is provided in Appendix I. This list is provided as a reference tool for recruiters and is NOT to be read during actual recruitment visits nor shown to respondents.

If a person states that he/she is not Hispanic or Latino but states that he/she is from or a descendant of one of the countries of interest for HCHS/SOL, the recruiter can further define the population of interest to HCHS/SOL to the respondent with the following statement: "The focus of HCHS/SOL is on persons or descendents of persons from Cuba, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Spanish speaking countries in the Caribbean and Central and South America. According to this, does anyone live in this household who is Hispanic/Latino?"

"Living in the household" is defined as anyone who resides at the sampled address and considers the address their permanent residence, regardless of their relationship to others who may be living at the same address. College students who still consider the address their permanent residence meet this eligibility recruitment. An exception to this definition is individuals on active military duty. Persons on active military duty who still consider the sampled address their permanent residence do not meet this eligibility requirement and are NOT eligible for participation in HCHS/SOL.

If there are not any Hispanic/Latino persons living in the household, read closing script and end recruitment. If there are 1 or more Hispanic/Latino persons living in the household, continue to Q2.

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- Q2 The question asks for the TOTAL number of people who live in the household who are Hispanic/Latino. This number should include all individuals, and not just those who meet the age requirements to be eligible to participate in HCHS/SOL. Enter the number of persons as a two digit value, i.e. 01, 05, etc...
 - If the respondent reports that there are zero (00) persons of Hispanic/Latino origin living in the household, read closing script and end recruitment. If the respondent reports 01 person or more, then continue to Q3.
- Q3 The question asks the respondent to report how many of the Hispanic/Latino people living in the household are between the ages of 18 74 years. Age is determined at the actual time and date of the initial contact. For example, if someone is going to turn 18 in 1 week, he/she is not eligible to participate. Likewise if someone is going to be 75 in a week, at the time of the screening interview he/she is 74 and is considered to be eligible. Enter number in a two digit value, i.e. 01, 05, etc...
 - If respondent reports that none of the Hispanic/Latino individuals living in the household are between the ages of 18 74, read closing script and end recruitment. If the person reports 1 or more Hispanic/Latino persons between the ages of 18-74, continue to Q4.
- Q3a The text for this question is NOT intended to be read to the respondent, but rather contains instructions for the interviewer. The interviewer compares the preprinted *selection p* and *cut-point c* on the form to determine if every individual in the household is invited to participate in the study OR if only individuals between the ages of 45 74 are invited to participate. If *selection p* is LESS THAN *cut-point c*, the whole household has been selected to participate, read script B and continue to the roster. If *selection p* is GREATER THAN or EQUAL TO *cut-point c*, only those individuals between the ages of 45 and 74 are invited to participate, read script A and continue to the roster.

If p<c, whole HH is invited to participate (script B)

If $p \ge c$, only 45 - 74 year olds are invited to participate (script A)

Roster Read the appropriate script based on Q3a as it appears on the form, making sure to capture the information on all eligible persons living in the household who are Hispanic/Latino and are in the appropriate age group (based on Q3a). The respondent is the first person rostered, person A.

First Name: Enter one letter in each box. It is not necessary to record each letter of the first name; interviewers may record only the first 4 letters of the first name. However, it is important to record enough information so that when the person is contacted for scheduling or goes to the clinic, he/she can be correctly identified.

Last Name: Enter one letter in each box. It is not necessary to record each letter of the last name; interviewers may record only the first 5 letters of the last name. As with the first name, it is important to record enough information so that when the person is contacted for scheduling or goes to the clinic, he/she can be correctly identified.

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Gender: Enter either M (male) or F (female).

Age: Enter the two digit age.

Relationship to respondent: Ask respondent for the relationship that he/she has with each person that is being rostered. Use the numerical codes that are located at the bottom of the HSR form to identify each type of relationship. The respondent is the first person rostered, and has the numerical code "01". Please note the list of relationships is not exhaustive. If the relationship is not listed, it is considered "other". Enter the two digit numerical code for the relationship to respondent in the appropriate boxes.

Telephone number: Ask the respondent for his/her telephone number (including area code). If other members of the household who are being rostered are present at the time of contact, obtain their phone numbers also.

It is possible that households will have a "general" household phone number and household members will have individual cell phone numbers. If this is the case, ask the person for the number that is the best one to reach them. Record this number as the main contact phone number on the roster. If additional numbers are given, write these numbers in the margins on the paper form. When entering the information into the DMS, additional numbers can be captured in the DMS using the note log function.

Case code: This number is used for information obtained on the person being rostered at the time of initial contact. This information may or may not be captured at the time of initial recruitment. If information is captured, enter the 1 digit numerical code for the situation/status listed.

Non-English AND non-Spanish speaker – Refers to a person who is unable to verbally communicate in either English or Spanish. Note: this does not include the hearing impaired.

Active military – Refers to a person who is currently in active military duty.

Moving away – Refers to a person who has plans to move out of the recruitment area within the next 6 months. Distances are: more than 100 miles/160 kilometers at San Diego and Chicago, more than 250 miles/400 kilometers at Bronx, or out of Miami -Dade County in Miami.

Homebound – Refers to a person who is unable to leave the home for a clinic visit.

Refusal – Refers to a person who at the time of initial contact states that he/she does not want to participate in the HCHS/SOL study.

Individual eligibility pending – Code is used if eligibility for the person is yet to be determined at initial contact.

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Individual eligibility determined – Code is used if eligibility for the person was determined at initial contact. This means that the Individual Eligibility Form (ELE) was completed.



HCHS/SOL Household Screen and Roster, Version B Frequently Asked Questions

1. Why can't everyone in the HH participate?

Although we would like to invite everyone in the HH to participate the focus of the study is to identify prevalence of and risk factors for cardiovascular disease and other conditions in the US Hispanic/Latino population. Generally speaking older persons are more susceptible to medical problems.

Interviewer: offer to gather names and contact information of persons that may be interested in being a clinic volunteers or a possible participant in an ancillary study

2. Why are you only inviting persons 45 - 74 years old?

Although there will be a small set of people under 45 years of age invited to participate, the specific age group of interest for this study is person aged 45 – 74. In general these persons are at greater risk to develop health problems of interest to the study like cardiovascular disease, diabetes, obesity, etc...over time.

3. I am 25 but am not in good health (have diabetes, CVD, etc...). Why don't I qualify?

We understand your concerns about your health, but the main focus of this study is on following older adults over time. A smaller number of persons under 45 years of age chosen by chance is also being invited.

Interviewer - offer to provide a list of resources of health related information to person. Ask for the persons contact information so information call be mailed to the person.
